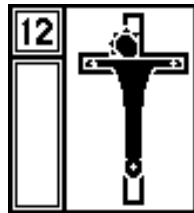


XI. Jesus is nailed to the cross (scriptural)

We adore thee, O Christ, and we bless thee.
Because by thy Holy Cross thou hast redeemed the world.

"And they bring him unto the place Golgotha, which is, being interpreted, The place of a skull. And they gave him to drink wine mingled with myrrh: but he received it not. And when they had crucified him, they parted his garments. And with him they crucify two thieves; the one on his right hand, and the other on his left. And the scripture was fulfilled, which saith, 'And he was numbered with the transgressors.'" Mark 15:22-24a,27,28

O GOD, who sparest when we deserve punishment, and in thy wrath rememberest mercy; We humbly beseech thee, of thy goodness, to comfort and succour all prisoners, especially those who are condemned to die. "And when the sixth hour was come, there was darkness over the whole land until the ninth hour. And at the ninth hour Jesus cried with a loud voice, saying, 'Eloi, Eloi, lama sabachthani?' which is, being interpreted, 'My God, my God, why hast thou forsaken me?' And some of them that stood by, when they heard it, said, 'Behold, he calleth Elias.' And one ran and filled a sponge full of vinegar, and put it on a reed, and gave him to drink, saying, 'Let alone; let us see whether Elias will come to take him down.' And Jesus cried with a loud voice, and gave up the ghost." Mark 15:33-37

"Mine eyes do fail with tears, my bowels are troubled, my liver is poured upon the earth, for the destruction of the daughter of my people; because the children and sucklings swoon in the streets of the city. They say to their mothers, Where is corn and wine? When they swooned as the wounded in the streets of the city, when their soul was poured out into their mother's bosom." Lamentations 2:11-12

XIV. Jesus is laid in the tomb (scriptural)

We adore thee, O Christ, and we bless thee.
Because by thy Holy Cross thou hast redeemed the world.

"When the even was come, there came a rich man of Arimathaea, named Joseph, who also himself was Jesus' disciple: He went to Pilate, and begged the body of Jesus. Then Pilate commanded the body to be delivered. And when Joseph had taken the body, he wrapped it in a clean linen cloth, And laid it in his own new tomb, which he had hewn out in the rock: and he rolled a great stone to the door of the sepulchre, and departed." - Matthew 27:57-60

GRANT, O Lord, that as we are baptized into the death of thy blessed Son, our Saviour Jesus Christ, so by continual mortifying our corrupt affections we may be buried with him; and that through the grave, and gate of death, we may pass to our joyful resurrection; for his merits, who died, and was buried, and rose again for us, the same thy Son Jesus Christ our Lord. STATIONS OF THE CROSS A LENTEN EXERCISE

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(Note: The biblical passages of this work are from the Authorized - King James - Version, and the prayers are from the 1928 Book of Common Prayer.)

The Stations of the Cross can be used weekly on Fridays throughout the whole of the Church seasons, as it is the day on which we remember our Lord's Crucifixion.

However, it is especially poignant during the Lenten season, and when used daily throughout Lent can be a powerful aid to the user's spiritual growth in Grace during this most holy season.

With that in mind, a unique and daily Lenten regimen is added, as follows (Note: this approach can be used as a six week experience at any time throughout the year, also):

First, on a daily basis, (1) read the narratives, (2) reflect and meditate on them, and (3) pray the prayers. Then, also add the following devotional work for a week's period of time, as noted below:

The First Week of Lent

Compare the passages of scripture (which are the Authorized, or King James, Version) with those of the Revised Standard Version.

Second Week of Lent

For the scriptural lessons noted from the gospels, try to find the parallel passages in the other gospels, and note the differences you find. Use an annotated Bible.

Third Week of Lent

Look up the prayers (all are from the 1928 Book of Common Prayer) and note in what context they are found - with what lessons, in what rite, etcetera. Do two prayers a day.

Fourth (Rose Sunday) Week of Lent

Focus on how each station's happenings reflect God's love.

Passiontide Week

Focus on how each station's happenings reflect the 7 deadly sins (one each day) - Pride, Greed, Lust, Envy, Gluttony, Anger, Sloth.

Holy Week

Focus on how each station's happenings reflect the 7 virtues (one each day) - Faith, Hope, Charity, Justice, Prudence, Temperance, Fortitude.

Throughout this most holy season, may our minds be raised from things on earth, and may we be renewed, strengthened, and rewarded with manifold blessings from God - all for His greater glory
